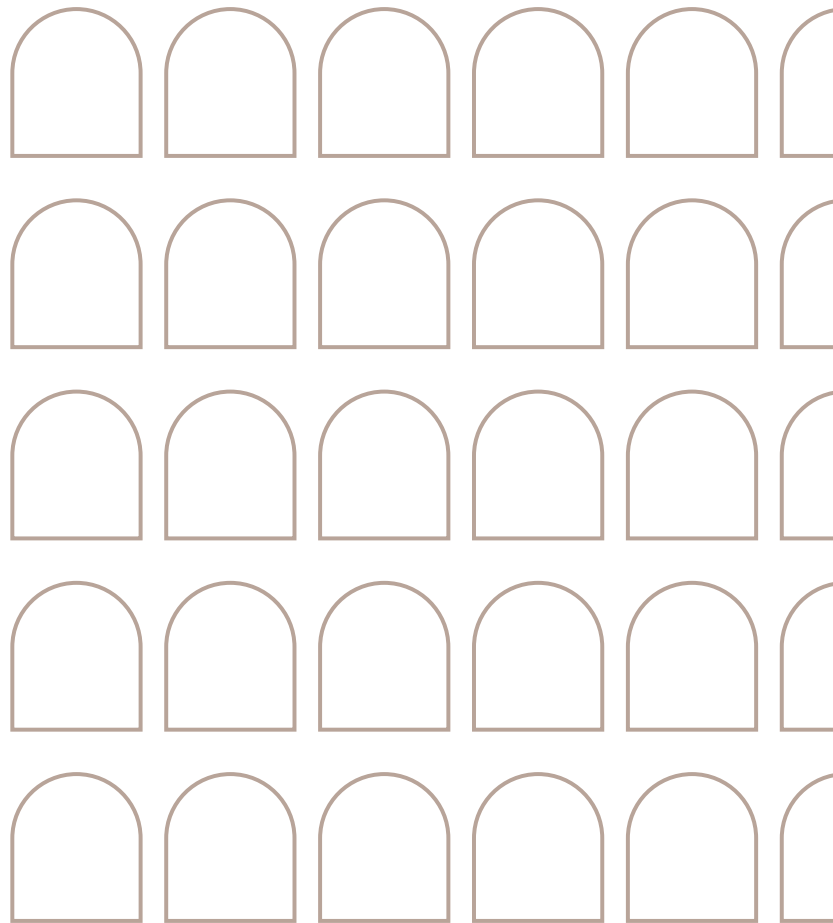
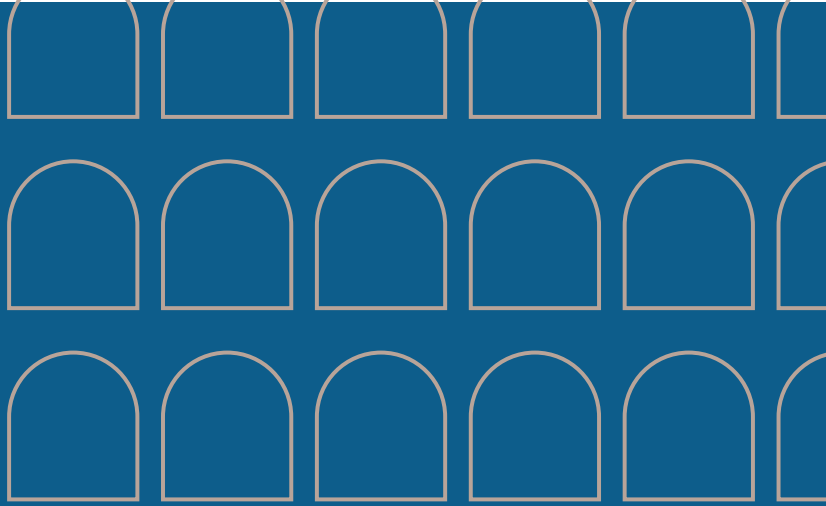

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SECTION 1

INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW



The mission of the Migration Policy Centre (MPC) at the European University Institute (EUI) is to conduct advanced research and training on the transnational governance of international migration, asylum and mobility. It provides new ideas, rigorous evidence and critical thinking to inform major European and global policy debates.

The MPC engages and collaborates with colleagues at EUI - including the School of Transnational Governance (STG), and the EUI's Departments of Political and Social Sciences, Economics, Law and History – as well as an extensive network of partners at other academic institutions and organisations with an interest in international migration and related public policy issues.

The MPC's **three core aims** are:

- 1. Advancement of academic research and knowledge:** The MPC conducts theoretical and empirical research that draws on a range of disciplines and methods. An explicit aim of our research is to make linkages across different types of migration (e.g. asylum and labour migration), geographies (e.g. linking migration processes and policies across countries and places), levels of policy-making and governance (e.g. global, supra-national, national, regional and local), and policy issues (e.g. linking migration to labour markets, welfare states, education, development, etc.). We believe that migration cannot be analysed comprehensively and regulated effectively without studying and understanding these important interconnections.
- 2. Policy engagement and dialogue:** The MPC aims to bridge academic research, public debates and policy-making related to the transnational governance of migration, asylum and mobility. We proactively engage with users of migration research to foster policy dialogues between researchers, policy-makers, migrants and a wide range of civil society organisations (including NGOs and the private business sector) in Europe and globally. In line with our aim to conduct research and analysis that connects different issues areas and levels of governance, the MPC seeks to contribute to major debates about migration policy and governance while building links with other key global challenges.
- 3. Training:** The MPC provides advanced training for researchers, policy officials, civil society organisations and others dealing with migration issues in the form of executive training courses and our highly successful annual Migration Summer School. These activities are based on the research conducted at the MPC. We coordinate the provision of training to the teaching and other activities of the EUI's School of Transnational Governance.



MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

I am very happy to welcome you to the Annual Activity Report for 2021 of the Migration Policy Centre at the European University Institute.

Our work here in MPC is organised across three main areas: research; policy dialogue; and training. In all of these areas, this report documents our activities and our attempts to build bridges between the research that we do and a wide variety of stakeholders. We do not see these three components as separate activities, but, rather, see each as being enriched by the others. This perspective informs all the work that we do and also how we understand the purposes of the Migration Policy Centre. We are very proud of the work that we have done that is documented in this Report not only for the scholarly contribution that we try to make but also through our efforts to communicate in ways that are accessible to a wide audience. In 2021 this meant that we focused on the production of webinars and blogs that have helped us to reach tens of thousands of readers, listeners and watchers.

whose commitment and enthusiasm helped make the Summer School a great success.

In 2022, we will once again be able to host in person meetings, but will maintain our commitment to use of online resources to reach as wide an audience as possible.

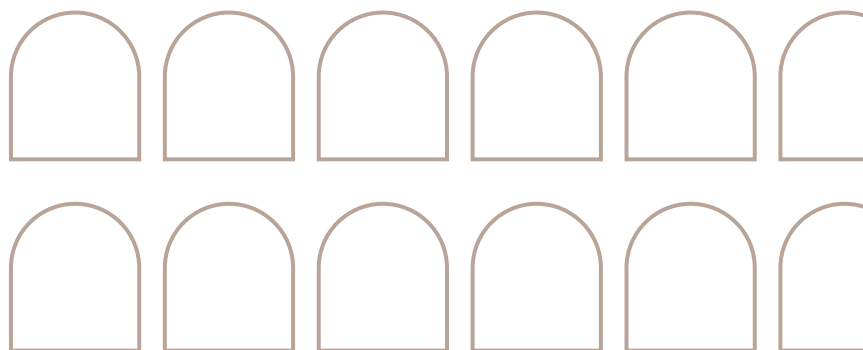

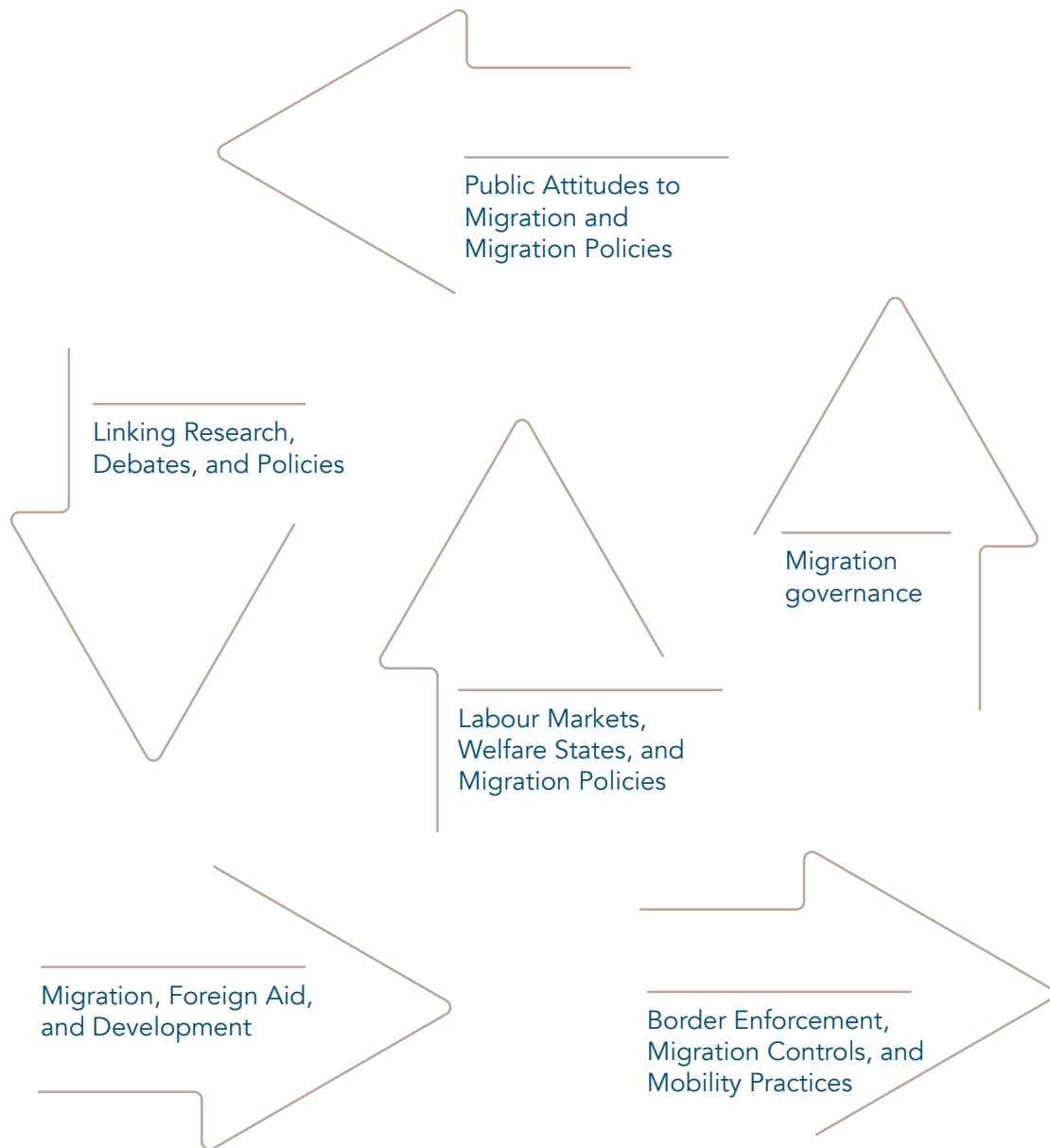

Migrants and Systemic Resilience: A Global COVID-19 Research and Policy Hub (MigResHub)

Funding: RSCAS, EUI

The primary aim of MigResHub is to facilitate research and policy debates on how migrant labour shapes the resilience of the provision of essential goods and services to the current COVID-19 pandemic, and to similar shocks in the future. The Hub concentrates on three essential goods and services around the world: food and agriculture; health services; and social care.



Free Movement of Workers and European Welfare States (FreeEUmove)

Funding: MPC

The right to free movement of workers is one of the fundamental pillars of the European Union (EU), yet the conditions under which it occurs have been subject to considerable political debates between EU Member States. Therefore, it is important to ask and analyse whether and why cross-country differences in national welfare institutions generate tensions with the free movement of workers, and how they can be reduced to help ensure the political sustainability of unrestricted intra-EU labour mobility in the future.



IT Tools and Methods for Managing Migration FLOWS (ITFLOWS)

Funding: H2020 DG Research & Innovation

ITFLOWS will propose tailor-made solutions for practitioners and policy makers for managing migration. The purpose of ITFLOWS is to provide accurate predictions and adequate management solutions of migration flows in the EU in the phases of reception, relocation, settlement, and integration of migration, according to a wide range of human factors and using multiple sources of information.



Global Asylum Governance and the European Union's Role (ASILE)

Funding: H2020 DG Research & Innovation

ASILE studies the interactions between emerging international protection systems and the United Nations Global Compact for Refugees, with a particular focus on the EU's role. Adopting an interdisciplinary perspective, it examines the characteristics of international and country-specific asylum governance instruments and arrangements, and their compatibility with international and regional human rights and refugee laws.



Observatory of Public Attitudes to Migration (OPAM)

Funding: MPC and International Centre for Migration Policy Development (ICMPD)

OPAM gathers and analyses data on public attitudes to migration from across the world. It produces cutting-edge scientific research explaining how attitudes to migration are formed and how they affect political outcomes at both the individual and country level. It provides expertise to national and international organisations across Europe and beyond.



Mercator Dialogue on Asylum and Migration (MEDAM)

Funding: Stiftung Mercator

The MEDAM project conducts new research to inform EU debates about asylum and migration policies, and to understand better the relationship between migration and development. Funded by the Mercator Foundation, MEDAM comprises of the Institute for the World Economy; the European Policy Centre; and the MPC of the EUI.



Global Mobilities Project (GMP)

Funding: MPC

The GMP creates and analyses a comprehensive database covering the demographic, economic, sociological, and legal-political dimensions of human mobility. The database will be a valuable, open source for researchers, the informed public and for policymakers, providing fact-based responses to questions about the causes and the consequences of human mobilities.



Un-Owned Personal Data

Funding: EUI Research Council

The project investigates whether advanced technologies, inherent in interoperable information systems in the Area of Freedom Security and Justice (AFSJ), undermine the fundamental rights of third-country nationals, including asylum seekers.

DoMiCoP

DoMiCoP – Diffusion of Migration Control Practice

Funding: H2020 DG Research & Innovation, Marie Skłodowska-Curie grant agreement

The migrant influx has increased the implementation of EU control actions. At the core of these actions stand communities of practice (organised groups of professionals who share a common concern) that elaborate knowledge and implement policy actions. However, the nexus between everyday acquired knowledge, communities of practice and policymaking has not yet been systematically studied. The EU-funded DoMiCoP project will provide answers on how and why communities of practice in the EU develop and diffuse the knowledge needed to activate migration control. The project will identify fields in which communities of practice are formed, analyse them by focusing on the configuration of actors and institutions involved, and reveal the role non-state institutions play in increasing knowledge about less-studied fields of policymaking and policy diffusion.



Europe's External Action and the Dual Challenges of Limited Statehood and Contested Orders (EU-LISTCO)

Funding: H2020 DG Research & Innovation

EU-LISTCO explores the challenges posed to European foreign policy by risks connected to areas of limited statehood and contested orders.



Citizenship, Migration and Mobility in a Pandemic (CMMP)

Funding: EUI Research Council, National Center of Competence in Research for migration and mobility studies (NCCR – on the move)

Public health measures to curb the spread of COVID-19 affect human

mobility. Some states apply these measures only to those with citizenship, while others include foreign residents and settled migrants. The CMMP team examines how these choices challenge understandings of citizenship, migration and mobility; specifically, by addressing three sub-questions: (1) who is guaranteed the right to cross the country's borders?; (2) who qualifies for evacuation and consular assistance?; and (3) who is entitled to public healthcare and social protection? The empirical analysis draws on an original longitudinal dataset of restrictions on human movement with global coverage (CMMP dataset).

DILEMMAS

The ethics of migration policy dilemmas (DILEMMAS)

Funding: MPC

'Dilemmas' analyses fundamental ethical dilemmas in policy-making on migration and refugee protection. 'Dilemmas' aims to expand the focus of existing normative research by adopting a 'bottom-up' approach that identifies specific policy challenges and dilemmas that migration policy-makers and civil society actors in the migration field face but that have not yet been considered by mainstream normative political theorizing.

E-MINDFUL

Enhancing Migration Narrative to Develop Further Union's Long-term actions (E-MINDFUL)

Funding: European Commission DG Home via the Organization for Security and Co-Operation in Europe (OSCE)

The E-MINDFUL project offers the opportunity to leverage the role and respective mandates of the ILO as custodian of the key international convention on labour migrations, and of the OSCE, a regional security organization with a multi-dimensional mandate on migration, in the framework of the EU Agenda on Migration. The E-MINDFUL project wishes to pool collective knowledge and experiences about communicating migration to explore effective messaging that can resonate beyond audiences who are already supportive, and to learn from impactful as well as counterproductive communication strategies.

AFAR

Algorithmic Fairness for Asylum-Seekers and Refugees (AFAR)

Funding: Volkswagen Foundation "Challenges for Europe" programme.

AFAR ('Algorithmic Fairness for Asylum Seekers and Refugees') investigates the usages of new technologies in migration and asylum governance, in particular the automation or part-automation of decisions normally taken by humans. The project includes work packages to map



the use of new technologies in migration and asylum in Europe; explore the evolving overlapping legal standards in this domain; analyse public attitudes and perceptions of fairness in the use of new technologies in migration and asylum governance; and develop proposals to reform practices for fairness. The MPC's contributions to AFAR include (i) analysis of public perceptions of the use of new technologies in migration and asylum governance, and (ii) the development of an executive training programme.



Migrant Integration in Small Communities (Whole-COMM)

Funding: H2020 DG Research & Innovation

Whole-COMM proposes an innovative whole-of-community (WoC) approach to the analysis of the integration of post-2014 migrants in small and medium-sized towns and rural areas (SMsTRA).

Gaza case study

Funding: DfID/UK Research and Innovation funded study: Collaborative Humanitarian Protection Research Programme via Proteknon

MPC contribution was to:

1. Plan the research, which includes meetings and coordinating with partners and other researchers on the team.
2. Conduct desk review of relevant literature.
3. Capacity building: a. Participate in training on Social Network Analysis and b. Train local research team
4. Supervise researchers and oversee data collection and data analysis.
5. Analysis and writing, including publications and research dissemination.

Study on “The state of play of Schengen governance -An assessment of the Schengen evaluation and monitoring mechanism in its first multiannual programme”

Funding: European Parliament

The scope of the study was to map the legal changes proposed in the New Pact in detail, and assess them as to their relevance, coherence, and fundamental rights compliance. The study was also to critically assess the application of the principle of solidarity and fair sharing of responsibility (Art. 80 TFEU).



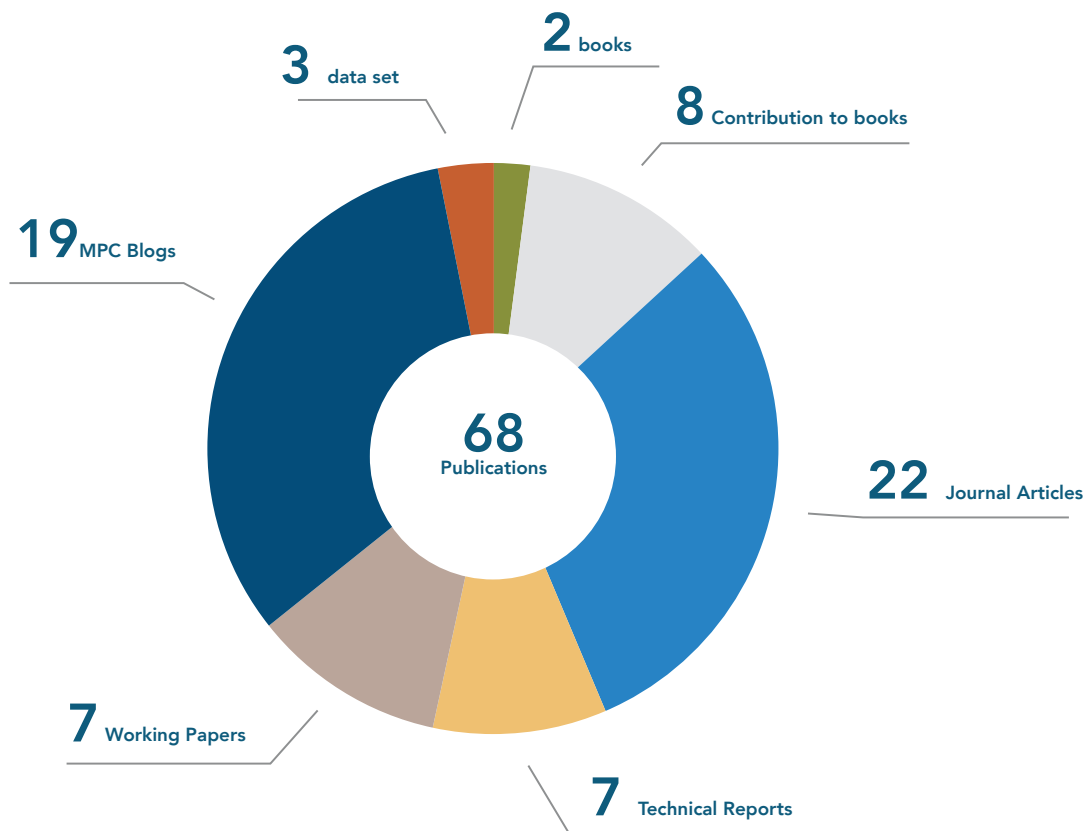

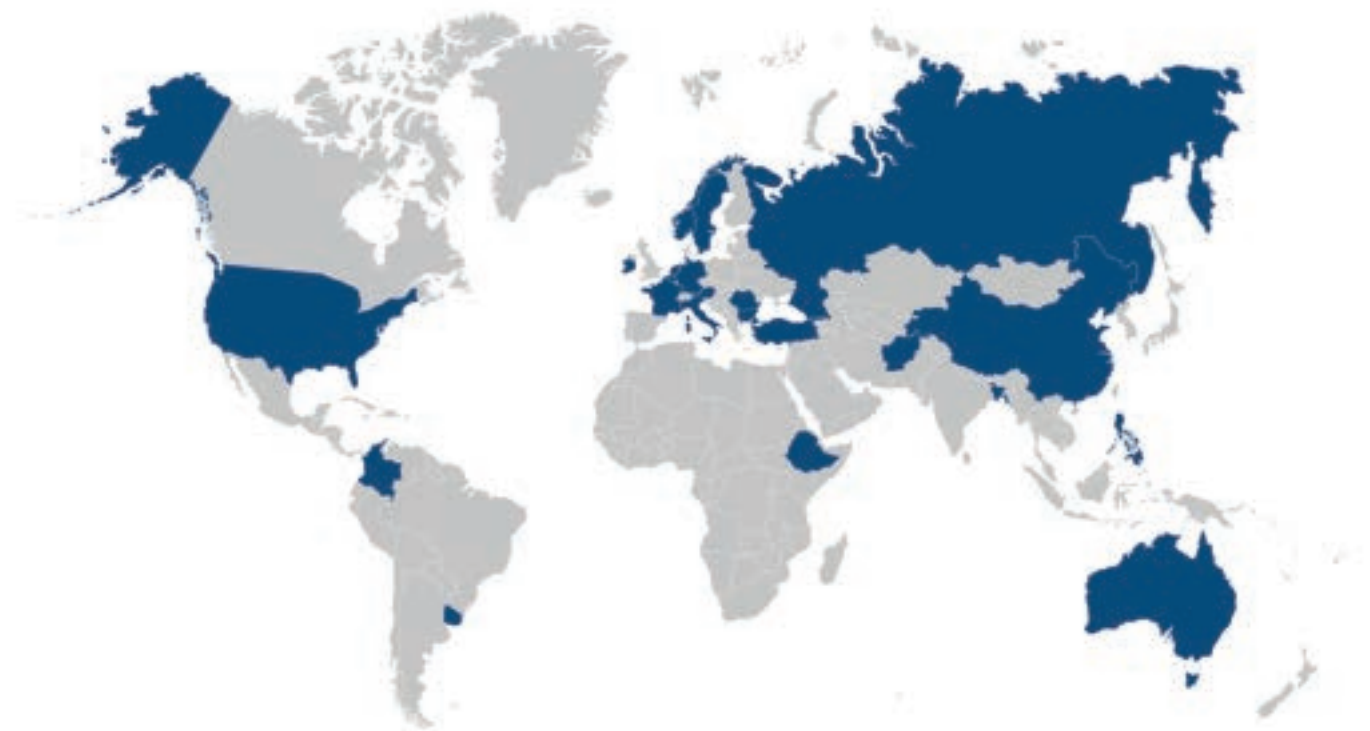
TRAINING AND TEACHING ACTIVITIES

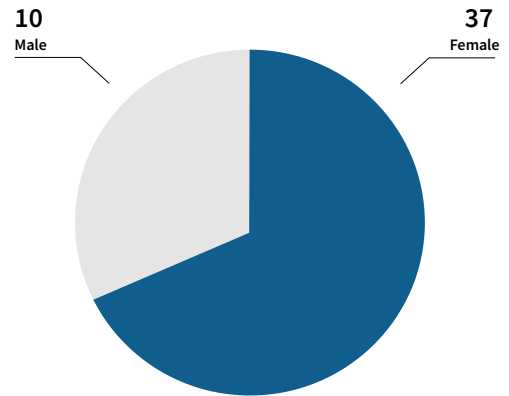
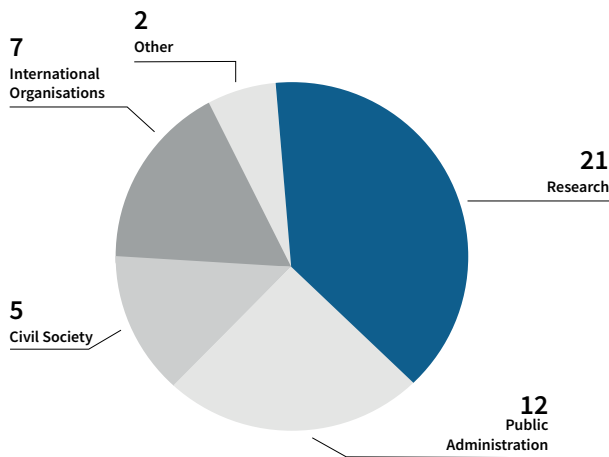

EXECUTIVE TRAININGS

EFFECTIVE MIGRATION MANAGEMENT

Dates: 26-31 May 2021

Format: online

Coordinators: Leila Haji Abdou, Giulio Di Blasi

This Executive Training is about developing and strengthening migration management skills. It explores the different stages of migration management from managing evidence to decision making processes to implementation. The Executive Training combines insights of migration theory and facts, with knowledge about challenges and opportunities arising from political processes, and practical perspectives that occur at the operational level. Participants learn to develop and apply migration management approaches from the level of policy design to implementation, taking into account operational constraints and opportunities. This Executive Training provides officers and practitioners working in the field of migration with a holistic approach, looking at the issue of migration management from different perspectives and across different key themes in order to share knowledge and upgrade key expertise. At the end of the training participants have a sophisticated understanding of the complexity, challenges, and trade-offs of migration management.

SUMMER SCHOOL

17TH MIGRATION SUMMER SCHOOL: 'MIGRATION AND THE PANDEMIC: TAKING STOCK AND THINKING AHEAD'

Dates: 28 June – 9 July 2021

Format: online

Coordinators: Andrew Geddes, Martin Ruhs, Lorenzo Piccoli

The 17th Migration Summer School focuses on the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on global migration while also seeking to learn lessons and think ahead. The Summer School provides an opportunity for participants to be able to contextualise and evaluate patterns and trends in global migration, to assess the extent to which these have been affected by the pandemic and do so in a genuinely global context. To achieve this objective, high-level scientific expertise are blended with extensive scope for participants to discuss their own ideas and to develop an enhanced perspective on their own professional and career development. Through an innovative approach to online provision, the 17th Migration Summer School addresses key themes and topics in global migration. It did so via a problem-oriented approach that facilitates critical engagement by participants with these key themes. Participants are supported by extensive background material, live webinars, group work, individual drop-in sessions with tutors plus session during which participants can present their own projects.

MASTERS' SEMINARS

GLOBAL MIGRATION POLITICS

Dates: 11 September – 1 December 2021

Format: hybrid

Coordinator: Lorenzo Piccoli

Participants: 12 students of the Master Programme in Transnational Governance at the School of Transnational Governance

Description: The seminar explores key concepts and ideas to understand global migration politics, looking at this phenomenon as a transnational issue that is shaped by a range of actors within and beyond the state. The seminar is issue-led, systematically connecting empirical questions with some of the related discussions of transnational politics and democracy. It comprises 12 sessions, which are taught together with leading experts from the field of migration. Two outcomes of this seminar have been the podcast '[Across Borders](#)', realised by students with the support of Lorenzo Piccoli, and the compilation of blogposts on the '[Transnational Governance of Migration](#)', written by students after a peer-review process coordinated by Lorenzo Piccoli.
